10 simple guidelines

- In the western world we tend to view images from left to right like reading
- Look for compositions that provide balance
- Make sure horizons are level
- Focus on the eyes of your subject
- Make sure the image has a proper subject
- Compose an image to lead the viewer to the subject
- Avoid looking down on animals
- Explore different angles and viewpoints
- Try different lenses
- Do not be happy with the first picture you take




Vertical or 'Portrait' Format




Horizontal or 'Landscape' format

Fill the frame



- Make the most of the space you have
- Fill the frame with the subject for more impact


Rule of thirds



- The rule of thirds is a simple compositional rule that helps you arrange a picture
- Divide the scene into three equal parts horizontally and vertically
- Try and place subjects on or near these lines. Avoid putting the horizon line across the middle
- The points where these lines intersect are called cardinal points (marked with white points). Any subject placed on or near here will have more impact
- It is not a fixed rule but simply a guideline.
 It can be broken successfully if you are willing to experiment

Look out for red





- Red is a powerful colour that commands attention
- Try and look for red subjects to use in your image as they will stand out more than other colours

Repeating patterns






- Patterns which repeat in an image can help provide balance and harmony
- They hold the viewer's attention better


Leading lines

- Use lines to draw the viewer into the image
- It will hold the attention and make the image more interesting

Focus, lock, recompose





 Focus lock and recompose allows you to place a subject off-centre for a more interesting composition

In One Shot AF

- Press the shutter button halfway
- When the Focus confirmation light is solid in the viewfinder, keep the shutter button half pressed
- Recompose your image to place the subject where you want it
- Fully press the shutter button to take the image
